MED provides construction contracting and technical support for the U.S. Central Command, various other government agencies and friendly foreign governments throughout the CENTCOM area of responsibility, and has since 1979. That area includes 20 countries within the Middle East and Central Asia regions show on the map.

The total estimated ceiling for these proposed MATOCs is \$3.8 billion, based on analysis of current and projected construction and design-build projects and programs anticipated in the region during the expected performance period (FY12 to FY16).

Task orders anticipated for these proposed MATOCs are generally expected to range from approximately \$20 million to \$100 million.

As part of an overall Corps of Engineers Acquisition Strategy for construction and design-build projects in the CENTCOM AOR, these MATOCs were awarded for a two-year base period with three one-year options. The majority of task order awards anticipated for these MATOCs includes vital projects directly supporting the U.S. Military and Government, including construction and design-build of facilities in the region.

The Army Corps of Engineers has been the lead Defense Department construction agent supporting the CENTCOM AOR since 1979. After the events of 9/11, MED delivered construction and design-build contracts within extremely constrained time schedules and budgets to support CENTCOM's contingency mission requirements through three MATOCs awarded April 3, 2002. The Corps of Engineers has worked with U.S. military and allied organizations in the Middle East and Central Asia regions since the early 1950s.
